WHO ARE SCOUTS?

Scouts are young people aged 10½ to 14 who:

- Master new skills and try new things
- Have fun and go on adventures, at home and abroad
- Make friends
- Explore the world around them
- Help others and make a difference, in their own communities and beyond

Week in and week out, they gather in groups called Scout Troops to conquer the small task of changing the world.

WHAT DO SCOUTS GET UP TO?

DISCOVERING THE WORLD

Being a Scout is all about discovering the world on your own terms and making the most of what you have, wherever and whoever you are.

Alongside your new friends, you'll master the skills that'll help you weather the storms of life, and try things you'd never get the chance to do at home or at school - working with trained volunteers to achieve whatever you set your mind to.

STARTING SMALL, THINKING BIG

Scouts start small but think big. They stand up for what they believe in and make a difference on their doorstops, confident in the knowledge that their daily actions add up.

In a society that can often feel increasingly isolated and inward facing, Scouts build bridges and break barriers.

WHAT DOES A SCOUT TROOP LOOK LIKE?

All Cubs are members of the global Scout family. Closer to home, they're also part of a wider local Scout Group, alongside Squirrel Scouts (aged 4 to 6), Beavers (aged 6 to 8) and Cubs (aged 8 to $10\frac{1}{2}$). When they're older, they can join Explorers (for 14 to 18 year olds) and - eventually - Scout Network (for our young adult members aged 18 to 25).

Within their Troop, Scouts are part of a Patrol - smaller groups of Scouts who look out for one another, and help each other grow. Scouts usually gather in their Patrols at the beginning and end of meetings. They might also stick together on expeditions or trips away, or during certain activities.

Joining us at 1^{st} Clifton

Scouts is open to all, and adjustments can always be made locally to make sure everyone can join in the fun. If you have any questions about accessibility, it's best to chat with your leader as soon as possible. By being upfront about additional needs from the start, parents/carers can work in partnership with local leaders to make sure their young person has the best experience possible. CAPITATIONS AND SUBS

Each year we have to pay a substantial fee to the District and the County for your child(ren) to be part of the Scout Association. We have to pay this fee regardless of whether your child(ren) has attended 5 weeks or 25 weeks.

A decision was made at not to go down the route of other groups and charge you the capitation fee directly, but instead, in line with other Scout Groups in the County, regardless of whether your child has attended or not, you will be required to pay subs for every week the group meets. You can choose to do this by either continuing to pay weekly and paying for the missed weeks when your child next attends or if you prefer, paying a lump sum each half term or term.



The subs are £40 per term. Bank Transfer is our preferred method and our details are below. Please put your child's name as reference.

YOUNG PERSON INFORMATION FORM/OSM (ONLINE SCOUT MANAGER)/GDPR

As with everything else, we have to abide by GDPR. When joining the group, a New Starter Form will be given to you to fill out. This will then enable us to put your child's data on OSM, you should receive a link to this system. Once you have, please check your child's details as this is essential information to keep your child(ren) safe. We need to ensure that this information is up to date and relevant in case of an emergency situation and this data is only shared with the emergency services. For us to do this, we need an email address to send it to.

As with a lot of Scout Groups, we use OSM to store our data; this is a secure database which enables us to have all the health information in one place and to input program and badge information.

You have the right to request information on what we hold on your child(ren) at any stage, and this will be deleted when you have informed us your child(ren) have officially left the organisation, or after 3 months of your child(ren) not turning up. Additional Health Forms maybe required for subsequent activities or camps.

We also want to try and get rid of paper as the majority of letters get lost by the child(ren). Please ensure there is an up to date email address on the form and let us know if this or any other information changes. However, paper copies will be available upon request.

UNIFORM

We at 1st Clifton always want to look our best and to do this your children will require a Uniform. Uniform can either be ordered online from the Scout Shop, from which you can buy anything Scout related. https://shop.scouts.org.uk/

Alternatively, we operate an "Own and Loan" service. This means we will subsidise the original cost of the uniform to £10 and whenever your child(ren) moves to another section and requires a new uniform, you return the old one and for £5 we will swap it for a replacement. With this however, you may be issued with a second hand uniform.



CAMP AND ACTIVITY BANK

There will be the option for you to pay in money to a Camp and Activity Bank. We understand times can be tough for everyone so this means that you can spread the cost of the camps and activities throughout the year when it suits you instead of being lumped with one large sum when an activity is due (unless you choose to; when an activity is coming up, you will be given the option then to pay the amount due or use any of the balance of your child(ren)s Camp and Activity Bank.

FAMILY ROTA/VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Our Scout Group is growing which means we are able to offer the friendship and adventure of Scouting to more local young people, which is fantastic! This does however, mean that we need more adults to volunteer their time to make a difference in their community. We fully understand that you may not be able to help on a regular basis which is why we have a Parent Rota.

As a helper on the parents rota you will be asked to assist with games and craft activities and support the young people to participate in activities. You will be guided by your section leader and will be a valuable part of the team. You will not be expected to take part in the "running" of the section including first aid.

Below are Parents Responsibilities to give you a better idea of what may be expected of you. If you do have any questions then please come and speak to one of us at the beginning or end of a session or give one of us a call.

We have a Safeguarding policy and there is a "yellow card" which can be given upon request. Please read through the dos and don'ts. I am sure you will understand this policy keeps our young people and adults safe.

- Listen to the young people and encourage them to participate in the activities.
- Interact with the young people helping them with activities and generally encouraging them to try their best. Encourage them to find the solutions to tasks themselves by working in a team.
- Encourage young people to join in the games and help to referee and ensure fair play!
- Try to avoid staying close to your own child encourage them to work away from you, both of you will have more fun!

If you are unable to do a date you have selected please swap with another parent and please let us know.

Younger children may accompany you on your rota evening but they remain your responsibility at all times.

Pictures for anything public would never be paired with a name or location.


BADGES
